## Valencia High School Choir - Syllabus

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Welcome to Choir at Valencia High School! In this class you will learn how to read music, sight read, create music spontaneously, analyze music, sing in 3-8 parts simultaneously and above all, how to sing correctly no matter what style you pursue. Above all, you will learn how to work as a team and make lasting friendships. This class syllabus contains some of the information necessary for you to have the best possible learning experience in Choir. You and your parents need to carefully read the following policies, sign the signature sheet and return the attached form.

## Course Introduction

Vocal Jazz is the most advanced of the choral ensembles here at Valencia High School. It performs challenging literature and jazz pieces from all of the various musical eras written for small vocal ensembles. The class concentrates on vocal improvisation (scatting), performing with a combo, and learning the basics that are essential to all musicians. Concentration will also be on solo singing, singing in a small group, and emphasis on part balance. Vocal Jazz will perform in school performances, and in extra-curricular activities. Although the Vocal Jazz group is not a "core academic class, it is considered a fine arts A-G elective.

Treble Vocal Ensemble is an experienced, advanced choral ensemble at Valencia High School. This group will sing all genres of music (Jazz, Classical, Pop, etc.) Concentration will also be on solo singing, sight singing, singing in a small group, and emphasis on part balance. Although the Treble Vocal Ensemble group is not a "core academic class, it is considered a fine arts A-G elective.

Concert choir is one of the most advanced ensembles consisting of auditioned vocalists at Valencia High School. It performs choral literature from all of the various musical eras. Styles performed include classical, jazz, folk, pop, and rock. Music from these styles will be sung in as many as five languages. Concert choir is considered a fine arts A-G elective.

Mixed Choir is a auditioned choral ensemble for the underclassmen and for those students who wish to improve their vocal skills. The class focuses on the instruction of basic vocal, sight-reading, and music theory skills. Repertoire from many choral styles is learned and performed. Chorus is considered a fine arts A-G elective.

Men's Choir, Barbershop, and Small Vocal Ensembles are auditioned extra-curricular groups for students who wish to perform outside of school and around the community. These ensembles accept paid gigs.

## Grading Policy

Rehearsal/Participation: Grades in this area are dependent on punctuality, preparation, active participation, effort, and continued improvement. Quizzes and testing will also be included in this area. $40 \%$ of grade.

Performance: Each performance is a test of the student's acquired knowledge in the choral area. Therefore a missed performance is equivalent to achieving a zero on a major test. Active participation, punctuality, effort, and quality are also determiners of the performance/test grade. $45 \%$ of the grade.

Theory/Musicianship/Final Exam: At the end of the term, the students will be evaluated on specific repertoire, theory books and sight-singing exercises individually or in a performance. A written exam might also be included. $15 \%$ of grade.

## Student Responsibilities

All of the student responsibilities are listed and explained in the Choral Music Contract. This is to be read and signed by the student and his/her parents. Students may be dropped from the class or be barred from performance if one or more of these expectations are not met.

B. Music Folder

A three-ringed BLACK $1 / 3$ inch binder is the folder we use in class.. Notebooks need to be with you everyday and will be periodically checked. Please separate into five sections. This notebook will be checked on Monday August 19 ${ }^{\text {th }}, 2019$ for a grade.

1. Listening Logs - students are required to keep a weekly listening log which will be checked periodically for in class listening journal warm-ups
2. Theory Assignments
3. Music
4. Tests/Quizzes
5. Fundraising Log

Notebooks should be brought to class
everyday. There will be notebook checks/quizzes throughout the semester.

## Extra Credit

Students are encouraged to participate in other extra curricular performing activities that have to do with music as long as they do not coincide with PERFORMANCE DATES. Some wonderful examples of extra-curricular performing is with the Santa Clarita Master Chorale, the Canyon Theatre Guild, a dance company that performs frequently, or any music related performing venue. Music growth is well rounded in design and extremely important to the growth of an individual overall.

Performances (with name in program) or 5 viewed performances (2 page essay written with ticket stub) are equivalent to a " + " boost in the grade.
" A " changes to " $\mathrm{A}+$." " $\mathrm{B}+$ " changes to " $\mathrm{A}-$," etc.

## WARDROBE/MUSIC/THEORY

1. TUXEDO/CONCERT DRESS: $\mathbf{\$ 6 0} \mathbf{- \$ 1 1 0}$. Fundraising opportunities will be available to help defray the cost of the uniform. See Mrs. Tavares-Mocha for borrowed / used dresses.
2. OTHER CONCERT ATTIRE: The student may be asked to supply a costume for the variety concerts or Jazz/Pop at a minimal cost (for example, the upcoming Fall Concert.)
3. CHOIR T-SHIRT - \$20 - Uniform T-Shirt for informal performances, trips, and rally days. See Mrs. TavaresMocha for borrowed t-shirts.
4. MUSIC: It is the responsibility of each student to maintain his/her music properly. Original Lost or damaged music will be billed at actual replacement cost.
5. CHOIR COMPETITIONS/TRANSPORTATION - Fundraising opportunities will be availabe to help defray, if any bussing contributions. See Mrs. Tavares-Mocha
6. THEORY - \$10 ONE MINUTE THEORY BY HOLLY SHAW-SLABBINCK - A collection of one-minute self-explanatory lessons that introduce the music signs, symbols, markings, and terms encountered in choral singing. Beginning to Advanced and the student's book to keep.
